The after school program in Clark has been going on now for about 10 years. Set up for preschool through fourth grade, for a daily minimal fee, students are fed a snack, get a little playtime in and may get their homework done or work on a craft or school project.

Betsy Kolden is the after school facilitator assisted by Julie McEl-

hone, Annette Boehnke and Lori Bjerke.

The routine is first to come to the elementary gym to get a snack and have Betsy take a roll call. A little time is spent eating and unwinding a little from their day, maybe playing with their friends in the gym.

Then about 3:40, the preschool through first graders go to the af-

ter school room which is the former sixth grade room. The second through fourth graders go to the library.

The older students in the library with librarian Annette Boehnke are then to work on their homework or

Vacancies for positions on local governing boards have begun. Petitions may be circulated and need to be filed by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, February 22, 2013.

Position openings include:

Henry School: Henry School District #14-2 holds their election the same time as city elections. One three-year term is open with the incumbent being John Rider. Dianne Easthouse is the business manager at Henry School. Clark and Willow Lake schools hold their school board elections in June.

Garden City: One council position will become vacant due to the expiration of the present term. Da-

Bipartisan approach seen this year during S.D. Legislature

State lawmakers on both sides of the aisle report a more bipartisan approach to their work this year during the S.D. Legislature.

"Three weeks into the legislative session," said Democratic House Leader Bernie Hunhoff, Yankton, said, and "this is the best bipartisan discussion in years."

Hunhoff said everyone has seen the "dysfunctional" situation in Washington and "all 105 have come back and said 'that won't be us.'"

Republican Senator Corey Brown, Gettysburg, agreed with the assessment, noting that everyone had watched the inability of Congress to get anything done and "folks got fed up with that... and they don't want South Dakota to operate like that."

Rep. Julie Bartling, Democratic leader from Platte, agreed, noting that she had "seen so much more openness and willingness to talk" than the last time she had served in the Legislature.

Legislative leaders from both parties, respectively, spoke with members of the South Dakota Newspaper Association on a number of topics when they met in Pierre Jan. 24.



Newspaper Day at the South Dakota Legislature is a good opportunity for publishers/editors to rub elbows with the local legislators, hear the Governor speak and to get up to speed on legislative issues.

At the noon luncheon last Thursday, Bruce Odson, publisher of the *Dakota Dunes North Sioux City Times* and the *Southern Union County Leader-Courier*, introduces himself to District II Senator Chuck Welke, with Rep. Burt Tulson and Rep. Brock Greenfield also visiting with Odson. The District II legislators took time out of their busy schedules for a visit, and then the topic turned to the Clark Legislative Cracker Barrel. A date and time will be forthcoming in the near future.

Brown, however, did not hold out hope that there would be any major changes or new initiatives coming out of the session.

He cautioned that looking at the proposed budget, giving three percent raises to state employees, Medicare providers and schools would take care of 75 percent of the budget.

Leaving less than \$1 million to be expended, Brown said, "probably does not allow room for major changes."

Hunhoff said three big areas are education, economic development

and healthcare. A fourth, corrections, is being addressed with a comprehensive overhaul of how minor offenders are rehabilitated. Following the news conference, the Senate passed that bill, the South Dakota Public Safety Improvement Act, sending it on to the House for its consideration.

Senate Democratic Leader Jason Frerichs, Wilmot, said there are at least four different bills this session that deal with various economic development programs.

The key, however, he said, is to "find that funding source outside of

the general fund (for those bills)." He called it a "guiding principle, along with transparency."

Brown said there is a misconception that economic development is a big company relocating in South Dakota, while "80-90 percent of economic development doesn't occur like that." This year's session has several pieces of legislation to consider that would be helpful to smaller businesses locating or expanding, including addressing in-

Clark Wind Farm is a step closer to reality

Oak Tree Energy, LLC received some really good news last week. On Tuesday, Jan. 22, the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission gave a verbal order as a final decision in regard to the Clark Wind Farm, developed by Oak Tree Energy.

According to Oak Tree's Michael Makens, the verbal order states that the wind farm shall have a Power

Purchase Agreement at a leveled rate for 20 years with NorthWestern Energy. Oak Tree continues to wait for the order to be finalized in a formal written manner.

"This marks another step forward towards making the Clark Wind Farm a reality that will benefit the entire community," said Makens.

Moderate construction boom in the ag community

The assessed value for new construction in Clark County in 2012 was 5.2 million dollars. In comparison, 3.7 million was assessed in 2011 and 4.7 million in 2010 if one was to look back.

County wide, 80 building permits were taken out. Eleven of those were new home permits. Three homes were finished in 2012, belonging to Mark Kannegieter, Anthony Bjerke and Gordon Spaete with permits taken out previously.

In the city of Clark, \$142,975 was spent on home additions, storage buildings, patios, fences and home improvements. Twenty-four permits were taken out for building in the city.

Glimpses from Greenfield

Comments from Dist. 6 Rep. Brock Greenfield

Hello from Pierre! The first three weeks of Session have proven to be busy, and they have absolutely flown by! However, much of the "busyness" has been taking place behind the scenes, with various briefings/presentations/meetings, etc. that help to lay the groundwork for the next several weeks. Of course, I have been working on various pieces of legislation, as well. In many cases, I have been collaborating with others who have sought my input, but I have a few bills in which I will be serving as the prime sponsor. I dropped three House bills in the hopper last week with my name at the top, and I have another one that I will be serving as the lead proponent on, but my seat-mate allowed me to list her as the prime sponsor, as the deadline for unlimited bills passed before our LRC staff got that one back to me.

I will discuss my pieces of legislation in future articles as they come up for committee hearings. For now, allow me to reintroduce myself to those who know me and introduce myself to those from the new part of our district. This year marks my 13th legislative session. Two years before I was elected to the Senate, I was a college intern, so this is the 14th year out of the past 15 that I have worked in the legislature. During my first 8 years, I served on the Senate Appropriations Committee. I also chaired the Senate Retirement Laws Committee for two years. Since moving to the House, I have been on the Commerce and Energy Committee, as well as the Taxation Committee. This term, I have been entrusted with the responsibility of serving as the chairman of House Tax. I kidded a couple people that for 8 years I was on the "spending committee" and now I'm on the committee that helps decide how much (or how little) we will be taxing you for the "spenders" to distribute. It is a responsibility I don't take lightly, as we all have strong feelings about government spending and tax burdens placed on the backs of South Dakotans.

Last week in Tax Committee, we heard HB 1090. This bill seeks to clarify that coaches of "certain amateur sports" are not subject to sales tax for the service they provide. Specifically, the bill's prime sponsor had learned that the SD Dept. of Revenue notified the American Legion Baseball coaches in her community that they owed the state tax on the income they had earned. Moreover,

they said VFW Baseball coaches and any others who were not direct employees (who receive a W2 form) from a city or organization for whom they work are "contract employees" who must remit taxes to the state for any income they receive. In testimony, it was pointed out that these "contract employees" are responsible to pay 15.3% of their earnings to the federal government for both their share and the employer share of social security, as well as other standard withholdings. The sponsor of the bill pointed out that if the state collects so-called sales/use tax from these employees, the combined tax burden would exceed 21.3% in most cases. She said it didn't seem right that these people who are doing a community service should be subject to an even higher rate of taxation than they would be if they were paid as direct employees, rather than contract employees. I inquired the representatives of the department whether t-ball/little league coaches would be subject to this higher tax rate, and they said those coaches would be considered to be coaching an amateur sport, and if those people received a 1099 form, they would have to remit sales/use tax to the state for their services. Back in 2005, the Legislature first took up this issue when we learned that the Dept. was seeking to collect taxes from VFW Teener and American Legion umpires. We passed a bill exempting them and all other referees of "amateur" sports. Governor Rounds vetoed that bill, but the Legislature saw fit to override the veto. The Taxation Committee passed the bill to the floor, 12-3, and the floor subsequently passed it, 53-17, with nobody speaking against the bill on the floor. Many of you know that I have coached for a number of years. In some cases, I have been a city or school employee, and in other cases, merely a guy who said "Yes" when asked to coach for an organization. It has never struck me that the standard changed based on the contractual agreement. If this bill fails somewhere along the way, it appears I, along with many others, will have to 1) write a check to the state, and 2) change the terms of our employment in the future!

There are many, MANY issues that will be of importance to you. I will try to keep you apprised of several of these matters throughout the session. I welcome you to e-mail me at rep.greenfield@state.sd.us to share your thoughts/concerns with me over any issues you are aware of. Please let me know of your thoughts with regard to the budget and/or policy matters. I have appreciated the opportunity to work for you, and I really do look forward to your input. Our e-mail inboxes tend to get backed up, and sometimes it is impossible to respond to each one, but they all get read. frastructure and housing. Sen. Russell Olson, R-Wentworth, noted that having good infrastructure is "a big component" in attracting or expanding business in an area.

Preventing an existing business from closing, Brown added, "is almost as big a win" as creating something new.

Rep. Tim Rave, R-Baltic, mentioned a "highly emotional" topic for the session is allowing school boards to hire a school sentinel to protect students and personnel from attack.

"No guns hasn't worked so well either," Rave said, so this bill opens the door for discussion. The next day that bill, HB1087, narrowly passed the House Education Committee and was sent to the House floor for the following week.

Republican House Leader David Lust, Rapid City, said his top priority is to "not enact bad legislation" and protect what is already in place.

Lust also said it should be noted that this year's Legislature is "tinkering around" with several so-called Open Government issues. He said it was credible that with all of the big changes in recent years, what is left now is fine tuning things.

Things are speeding up at the Legislature. I serve on Retirement Laws, Local Government, and Taxation. The number of bills is accelerating at a very fast pace. Trying to keep up is challenging so I appreciate the input from the constituents and I hope that you will continue to let me know what you are thinking.

One of the most far-reaching decisions faced by the legislators this Session is whether or not to expand Medicaid for an estimated 48,000 South Dakotans currently uninsured. Because the federal government will cover 100% of the health care costs for the expanded group, the state's contribution is primarily for administrative costs. According to a study done by the Kaiser Foundation, for every additional dollar SD might spend on expanded Medicaid eligibility, it would generate \$13.43 in federal funds. Lawmakers in Pierre will hold another study session on Medicaid expansion on Feb. 5. Leaders of both parties have invited the Council for State Governments to send an expert to meet with all interested parties. We'll continue to study this important issue in the coming weeks.

We all believe in economic development, but it must be a wise use of taxpayer's dollars and lead to true economic growth. Taxpayers deserve as much "bang for their buck" as possible when it comes to economic development. One program that has us concerned is SD Wins.

The SD Wins program was advanced last year through the Governor's Office of Economic Development and was established with a 5 million dollar appropriation from the General Fund. The goal was to recruit 1,000 new workers from outside of SD for hard-to-fill jobs. The cost of the recruitment of each employee is split 50/50 between state government and the company making the hire.

In the first year of the three year program, SD Wins has spent \$500,000 of tax revenues to recruit and place 55 employees with ten SD companies. In addition, each month SD taxpayers pay the Wisconsin-based recruiting company, Manpower, a \$49,000 fee whether or not there is a new employee recruited that month. This year alone, SD taxpayers have spent an estimated \$8,000 per job to recruit these workers to our state, not to mention the required match by the private companies making the hire. If this program is to continue, it is only right to do a cost-benefit analysis and let those results determine its future.

Providing quality schools is often called the very best tool of economic development, especially in bringing growth to our rural communities. When considering whether to locate

in any town, large or small, one of the first concerns is the quality of the local school system. One study done by the Federal Reserve Bank in Minneapolis even suggests that providing quality pre-schools has a direct correlation to economic growth in the community.

Education continues to be the dominant issue of our Session. The number of opt-outs now in effect is alarming and proves that the state continues to push the obligation to fund our public schools to local taxpayers. This school year 66 of our 151 public schools are currently in an opt-out with many more Districts likely to try to passage soon if the state continues to underfund schools.

The Governor's Proposed Budget for K-12, brought forth by the Department of Education to Joint Appropriations this week, is a request for a 3.0% increase and would raise the funding formula from \$4,491 to \$4,625 for an increase of \$134 per student. (Inflation was actually 3.2% but the law says 3% or the rate of inflation, whichever is less). To put the amount in perspective, the 2008-09 per student allocation was \$4,642 so the FY14 amount is \$17 less per student than five years ago! We can and must do better for our students! Please continue to share with me your reflections on education cuts and how it has affected your local school.

When talking about smart economic development, we should commend Tourism. The Tourism Division continues to be an outstanding example of public-private partnerships effectively using resources to promote South Dakota. No General Fund dollars are used. The Tourism Division is funded through a summer month 1.5% gross receipts tax on tourist industries and a percentage of the gaming tax. It is estimated that 70% of these revenues come from out-of-state visitors. In addition to promoting tourism in SD, this department funds such entities as the Cultural Heritage Center, SD Arts Council, and the Archeological Research Center. As the Tourism Division moves forward they hope to put more emphasis on Tribal Tourism and Rodeo promotion.

It has been an exciting and hectic three weeks and it will continue to push us to get things done. We are all concerned with what the Federal Government will do and how that will affect the State Budget. There has been some talk about the need for a special session. It is an incredible process as the bills all take time to work their way through. A lot of them don't move forward but they all have their day in committee for a full hearing and this takes time. Keep posted on the bills and let us know your concerns.

We have some Cracker Barrels scheduled for the upcoming weekends. I think one more will be added in Clark. The first one is February 2nd in Aberdeen from 10:00-12:00 a.m. at NSU. Other dates: February 9th at Lake Norden (10:00-11:30), February 13 at Redfield (2:00), February 23 at Aberdeen (10:00-12:00), and March 2 at Aberdeen (10:00-12:00). The issues, he said, were "not trivial, but not paramount." Several of the bills were killed in committee the previous day, despite having been the product of a summer study group.

Short takes from the State Capitol

The South Dakota House overwhelmingly passed a resolution calling for the U.S. Supreme Court to revisit the controversial Roe v. Wade allowance of abortions. Prime sponsor Jim Bolin, R-Canton, noting the anniversary of the decision, questioned "Why does 40 years not settle the question?" The House Concurrent Resolution, which passed 68-10 on Jan. 23, now must pass the Senate before reaching its destination. It carries only a message to the Supreme Court.

The South Dakota Senate endorsed a bill that would create a system to track the employment of South Dakota college and technical school graduates who stay in the state. The Department of Labor and Regulation would track the figures. The bill now heads to a House committee for its first hearing.

Senate State Affairs Committee overwhelmingly endorsed a bill to designate March 30 as Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day in South Dakota. Returning ser-

vice people "were not greeted very warmly" when they returned. Many still bear the emotional and physical scars of their service. The proposal to name the working holiday passed the full Senate on Friday with no opposition and now will travel to the House for its consideration.

The House Education Committee approved and placed on the House consent calendar HB1098 to increase bonding authority for the state's four technical institutes in Rapid City, Sioux Falls, Watertown and Mitchell. It was noted that South Dakota is the only state where technical schools need to come to the Legislature for bonding authority. This bill increases that authority from \$105 million up to \$140 million. No opposition is expected when a bill is placed on a consent calendar.

The House Local Government Committee narrowly defeated (7-6) and sent to the 41st day a bill that would have prevented law enforcement personnel to conduct a search, seizure or detention of an "otherwise law-abiding person" for possession of a handgun without a permit. The bill, HB1010, would have provided an exception to a misdemeanor offense.

A New Mindset About Obesity

I need to tell you frankly that trying to encourage people to lose weight is like telling them they should stop growing older, or to advise men going bald to stop losing hair. Most heavy people would love to be thinner, but it seems once the weight comes on, it is destined to stay there.

People blame the American diet, excesses of labor saving devices, and the addiction too many of our children have with video games. I believe that the epidemic of obesity in our society has something to do with the inactivity of our youth, but actually we don't know why some adults are heavy and some are thin. I will even go one step further in stating that until we truly understand why obesity happens, we will NOT have an effective non-surgical treatment.

One thing is for sure; obesity is not due simply to excessive eating alone. More than one study points out that many thin people eat more than many obese. The corollary is also true; simply deciding to eat less does not solve the problem, at least in the long run.

The most successful of commercial methods, like Weight Watchers or TOPS, apparently help only about one third lose significant weight. What's worse, only one third of those are able to keep it off one year, and then after five years, virtually all have regained their original weight.

Here is the good news next to all the bad. There is new data, which shows that heavy people, who are able to significantly exercise, don't lose weight, BUT they gain in quality of life. These heavy exercisers have the same chance for a long and healthy life as do thin people.

We all need a new mindset. Instead of weight loss as the goal, which for the most part is unachievable, we should do all we can to bring people to exercise, and that goes double for our kids.

Let's get off that couch and get moving, even if it's limited at first. And then we should love ourselves for doing it, whatever weight we may be.

maybe Accelerated Reading or educational packets made for the students. They work on these until 4:15. Then it is free time. If they want to do a craft, they go to the after school room where all of the supplies are and join in with the younger students. Or, they can stay in the library and read, go on the computer to educational sites or maybe even play a board game such as Clue or Sorry with their friends. The younger ones usually work on their educational packet or craft for a half hour and then it's free time for them too. The last 45 minutes are playtime until 5:00 p.m. when the program ends for the day. "Sometimes community members contribute to the after school program by donating toys or craft items or games which we really ap-

preciate," mentions Kolden. "We are not a state funded program, this is a school program." Kolden, McElhone and Bjerke are all paraprofessionals and Annette is the school librarian. Lori usually works until 4:00 on a 'need be' basis. Kolden puts together age appropriate activities that are seasonal based, such as snowman activities at this time of the year. Only on school days are the after school activities with guidance, which are Mondays through Thursdays. "We usually have anywhere from 23 to 33 kids here after school. We charge by the day with a little extra for the snack. This is a nice program for the community. There is really a need for it," ends Kolden.

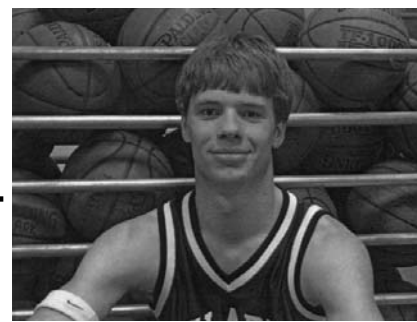

Kenneth "Kenny" Sass, 67, of Webster, died Wednesday, January 9, 2013 at an Aberdeen hospital.

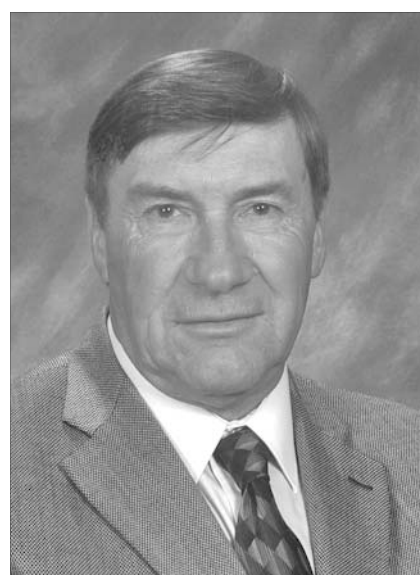
Funeral services were held Saturday, January 12, 2013 at Christ The King Catholic Church in Webster. Interment followed at St. Otto's Catholic Cemetery.

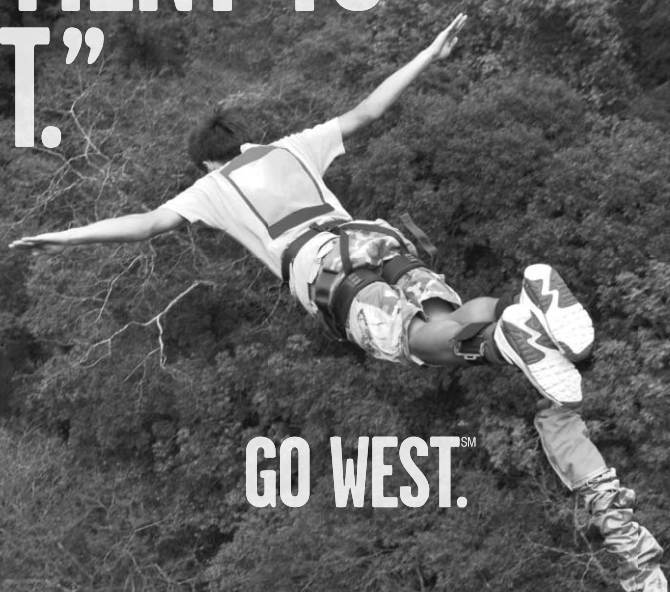

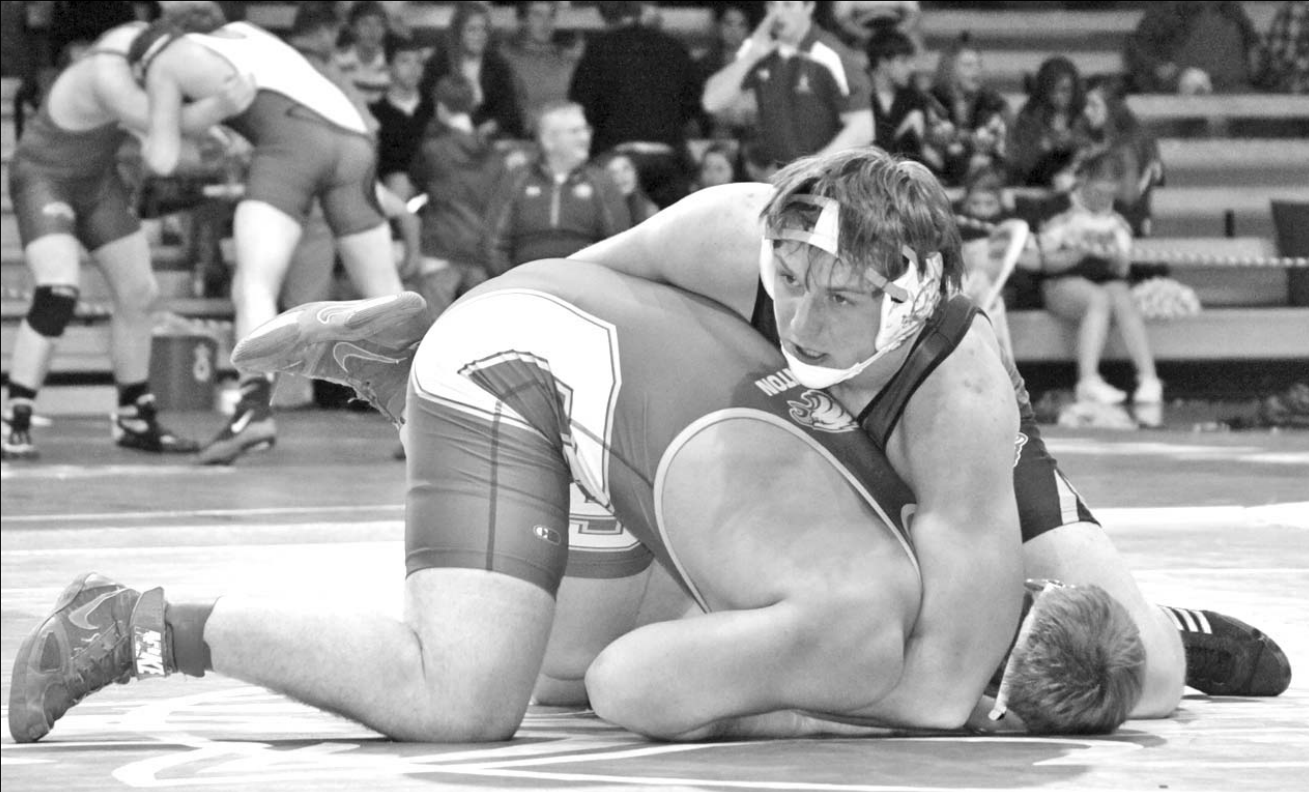

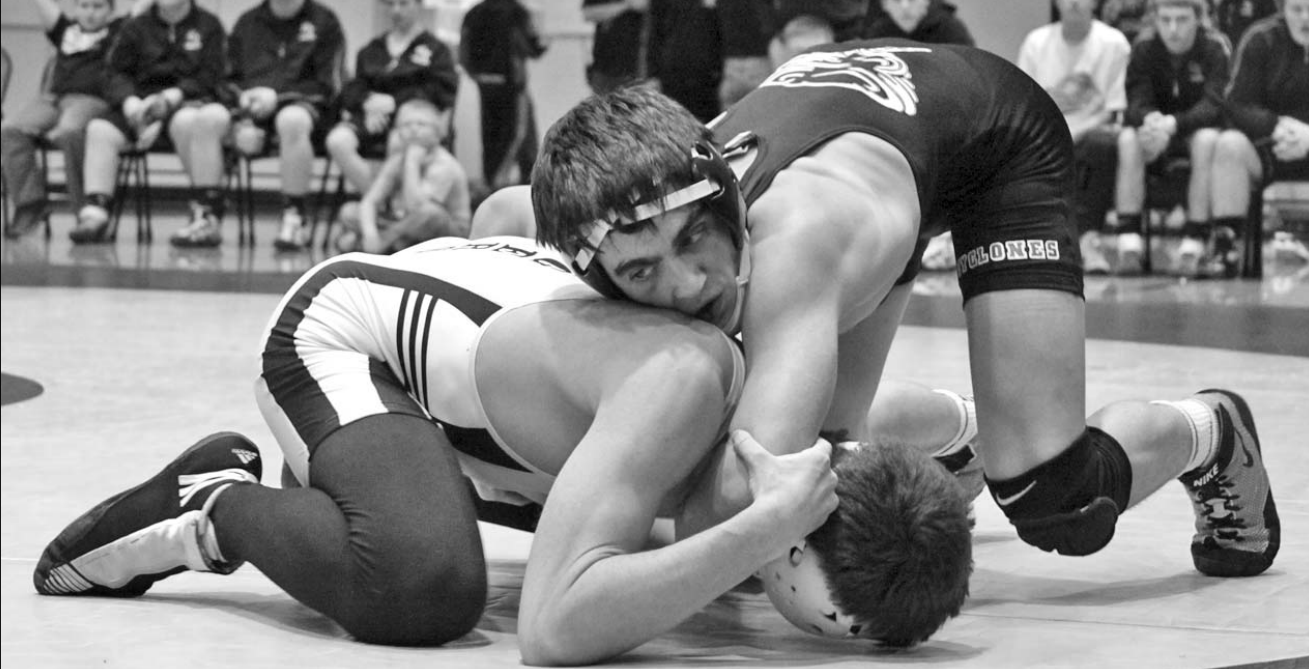
