# Clark Wind Farm is now generating energy

Editor's note: This press re- lation comprised of eleven General lease from ConEdison Development of New York announces that the Oak Tree Energy Wind Farm is/or has begun. It is official, the Clark Wind Farm is now generating energy!

A parcel of land in Clark County, South Dakota - owned by a respected family with roots in the state dating back to 1901 - will soon serve as a wind farm providing enough electricity to power approximately 5,000 homes in the region for a year.

Fulfilling the vision and through the effort and personal commitment of owner Leonard ("Bill") Makens, a portion of the more than 7,000acre Oak Tree Lodge family farm and hunting lodge is now home to a soon-to-open wind power instalElectric 1.85-87 wind turbines with a combined capacity of 19.5 mega-

# City council finishes financials for 2014

The Clark City Council met in cil gave this additional 1¢ sales tax special session Monday night, specifically to finalize 2014 financials.

The meeting began with the council approving a \$6,686 contingency transfer.

Finance officer Jackie Luttrell then spoke of potential South Dakota proposed 2015 legislation that would be beneficial to cities and supported by the S.D. Municipal League. This proposed legislation would be an additional 1¢ sales tax for cities, specific for infrastructure.

This bill was introduced in 2010 and will be attempted in 2015, said Luttrell. If passed by the state legislature, each respective municipality would have to have the voters in that respective community approve the project. The City of Clark coun-

a unanimous vote of support.

The ordinance regarding the removal and towing of parked cars after it snowed, for snow removal purposes, was approved by the city council.

The council then met as a Board of Adjustment and approved for the Pheasant Apartments, formerly the Pheasant Motel, a conditional use permit, needed for apartments in property zoned as highway commercial, which this property is, on the east edge of Clark. Lonnie Phipps, of Watertown and Terry Binger were in attendance during this action. Phipps, it was noted, is buying this property from Binger.

## Kim Kaufman rewarded for great 2014 It's pretty cool that when one

lives in a small town, one knows everyone and when an individual leaves the small town and does so well on a global playing field, it's pretty special. It's also pretty special to be able to watch that same young golfer turn into a very charismatic young lady.

Earlier this month, Clark's own Kim Kaufman was named the 2014 South Dakota Independent Female of the Year, by the S. D. Sportswriters Association. She also won this coveted award in 2012.

The 2009 C. H. S. graduate made her presence felt as a rookie on the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) Tour this summer and fall, playing in 19 tour events, finishing 59th on the money list.

Kaufman has earned her LPGA tour card for 2015 and what is so exciting for this young golfer is that she will be able to concentrate for an entire year, solely on LPGA

When she graduated from Texas Tech in 2013, she immediately went to the Symetra Tour, half way through the season, to help gain her LPGA card. As 2014 started, she was on the Symetra Tour and her accomplishments opened the door for the LPGA tour and Kaufman has opened that door wide and 2015 should be an exciting year for her on the tour.

"I'm looking at playing probably about 25 events this year," the 6', 23-year-old said in an interview this week. She has been spending the holidays with her family in Clark. Terry and Teresa Kaufman are her parents and Ashley is her older sister.

The goals that come with playing in 25 tour events Kaufman stated are - 1) being in contention for a tour victory; and 2) ultimately playing well enough to be a contender Kaufman


