Public meeting held regarding County Road #17 reconstruction

IMEG Corporation, a construction engineering company from Aberdeen, South Dakota, held a public meeting Tuesday, April 2 in the basement of the Clark County Courthouse in Clark. The meeting started at 1:00 p.m. and lasted approximately one

IMEG Project engineer Adam Polley was the speaker and IMEG Civil Project Engineer Troy Nelson ran the PowerPoint presentation.

During the eight-slide presentation, three phases were discussed. Phase One consists of the pipe culvert work for the entire project. Corrugated metal pipe will be put in the south 12 miles and reinforced concrete pipes will be put in the north five-and-a-half miles. As long as the weather cooperates, this phase should begin May 6 and run through June 7. "Please keep in mind that these dates could change if we get quite a bit of rain in April," Polley emphasized.

During Phase One, there will be small road closures throughout the area of the project, with multiple closures happening throughout the duration of the project. The work will

start at the north end of County Road #17 by U.S. Highway 212.

Phase Two is set to start June 10 and run until August 26. The road will be closed to through traffic and open to only local traffic during this time. This will include the structure replacement south of 176th Street, with roadway work north for five-anda-half miles.

Phase Three is slated to start August 26 and go through October 9. During that time, the road will be open with flaggers and a pilot car. "Keep in mind, there will be a delay in travel due to it being a one lane road as the pavement is being laid," said Polley. "No wide loads are recommended during this time, but if you have to be traveling this road with a wide load, please let us know ahead of time so we can have a heads up," he added.

Polley stressed, "Communication is huge during this time and much appreciated." This project has been in the making for about three-and-ahalf years. If you have any questions or concerns, feel free to contact Troy Nelson at (605) 351-3663 or Adam Polley at (605) 660-9180.


Located in the field house, were three bounce houses for children of all ages. In the gymnasium, Chamber members held a free two-card bingo. People of all ages came to join in on the fun.
