Major General Don Goldhorn: "Freedom is never free"



New teen driver requirements go into effect July 1, in S.D.

It's the time of year when student drivers are out and about racking up the miles and getting hands-on experience behind the wheel.

Joel Huber of Clark, is in his 24th year of teaching drivers education at Clark High School. On Tuesday, May 25, they completed their classroom time and have now moved on to the driving portion of their education.

Teen drivers requirements
As of July 1, 2021, new state laws will come into effect in regards to the instruction permits. Parents will become more involved with the new laws moving forward.

On top of the 50 hours of adult supervised driving time that will need to be logged, 10 hours of it must be after dark and 10 hours must be in inclement weather, driving in the rain or snow.

The steps to a drivers license are: an instruction permit; a restricted minors permit and finally one's unrestricted license or operator's license.

One must have held a restricted minors permit for six months in addition to being 16 years of age to get their operator's/unrestricted license.

Regarding the instruction permit, the minimum of 180 days has been moved up to 275 days (180 days with drivers ed) for the time driven with an instruction permit. Fifty hours will need to be logged at
